


## **Accessibility Lounge and Sensory Spaces**

Moreover, the library actively seeks feedback from users to continuously refine and improve these spaces, demonstrating a commitment to responsiveness, adaptability, and user-centered Partnerships and collaborations play a crucial role in the development and support of these sensory spaces. Schomberg mentioned ongoing communication with accessibility resources, student organizations like Neurodiversity Student Group, and involvement with the Disability Affinity Group on campus. commitment to and active involvement beyond the traditional academic framework.





This session aims to equip participants with a solid understanding of restorative practices,

including its core principles and practical applications within organizations and groups. By the end of the training, participants will possess the skills to establish a secure environment that fosters support and facilitates the process of repair. They will gain the ability to engage in therapeutic processes by conducting self-evaluation, which involves reflecting on their conflict resolution approaches, applying an equity perspective, and addressing implicit biases. Additionally, they will learn how to gather essential information and build strong cases before initiating restorative procedures involving multiple parties. The workshop is open to all library services personnel.
