Artist Statement: "Hands Up, Don't Shoot" became a rallying cry for Ferguson, Missouri residents who took to the streets to protest the fatal shooting of a Black, 18-year-old by a White police officer, Darren Wilson. Witness accounts spread after the shooting stating Michael Brown had his hands raised in surrender,

mouthing the words "Don't shoot"; these were his last words before being shot execution-style. The gesture of raised hands became a symbol of outrage over mistreatment of unarmed Black youth by police.
