### HISTORIC MINNESOTA STATE MANKATO STUDENT MAGAZINES DIGITIZED

Two historic student magazines published from 1888-1913 by Mankato State Normal School have been digitized, thanks to a Minnesota Historical Society Historical and Cultural Heritage Grant to Minnesota State University, Mankato's University Archives.

The Mankatonian and The Student were monthly magazines published by Mankato State Normal

School students during the school year and a few summer sessions The Student was published from 1888-1891, when the name was changed to The Mankatonian, published from 1891-1913. Both publications included summaries of school activities, poetry and articles, social events and other

topics of interest, as well as advertisements from area businesses. Digitization makes the volumes available to researchers, genealogists, students and all Minnesotans through the university's digital collections site, http://mldm.lib.mnsu.edu/.

The content provides a students-eye view of the history of the university, the Mankato area and Minnesota higher education at the turn of the  $20^{th}$  century. Before they were digitized, there was no index or way to search the magazines. The digitized text is now fully searchable – made possible by optical character recognition software.

Historical and Cultural Heritage Grants are made possible by the Minnesota

Legislature, from the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund, created with passage of the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment to the Minnesota Constitution.

### Professor Kiyo Suyematsu and the Minnesota State University Music Library

It is with regret that we report the passing of beloved Music Librarian Kiyo Suyematsu: April 1926 – September 18, 2011

Kiyo Suyematsu was born in Laramie, Wyoming in 1926. She was taught to play piano by her mother and went on to receive a Bachelor and Master's degree in piano from the University of Colorado. A hand injury forced her to forego solo performance. In its place, she became involved in teaching piano lessons to groups.

In 1963 Kiyo Suyematsu came to Mankato State College (MSC) to establish a group piano program. At that time, few colleges had facilities for listening to sound recordings. Kiyo was well aware of the importance of music listening and became involved in the establishment of the first Music Library in Nichols Hall on the Old Main campus. After the move to the upper campus in 1968, the Music Library was given a new home in the Earley Center for Performing Arts room 201.

In the late 1960s Professor Suyematsu earned a second Master's degree in Library Science at the University of Denver and her job title expanded to include the title of "Music Librarian." Held in high esteem by her colleagues, Kiyo was active for many years in the Music Library Association (MLA). Kiyo worked tirelessly to build the Music Library as a major resource for music materials for the campus and community. She and renowned Minnesota State Mankato cataloger Nancy Olson devised a system for adding music scores and recordings to the online catalog.

Kiyo was highly regarded by her peers on the Minnesota State Mankato campus. She is fondly remembered as an excellent teacher who worked well with students and staff. After retirement in 1991 Kiyo remained active professionally and continued to be a familiar face at Minnesota State Mankato, where she was a member of the Minnesota State University, Mankato Heritage Society. In 1999, she was inducted as a "Partner" in the Minnesota State Mankato Purple and Gold Society recognizing her lifetime contributions. Kiyo's many gifts to Minnesota State University included a scholarship endowment to recognize accomplished music students.

In the spring of 1995, the University music faculty voted unanimously to name the music library for its founder. As a result of vision, determination and generosity, several generations of faculty, students and community members have been served very well by the Kiyo Suyematsu Music Library.

Alt-Press Watch is a unique database that showcases diverse voices from a variety of grassroots newspapers, magazines, and journals. The database features over 670,000 articles from around 200 publications and provides alternative coverage to the corporate controlled media. All of the publications are presented in 100% full text, allowing researchers access to


