




















The final decision

The Editor-in-Chief is responsible for the final decision to reject or recommend the manuscript for publication. The decision will be sent to the author(s) along with reviewer recommendations. Authors may be asked to revise their manuscript in keeping with reviewer comments. Revised manuscripts may be returned to the original referees for review or alternate reviewers chosen. The Editor-in-Chief may request more than one revision of a manuscript.

Publication Frequency

Individual items will become available on line as soon as they are ready and combined into two full issues per year.

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Editorial

The Need for Stigma Research and Action

Stigma and discrimination affect the lives of people who are perceived as different from the norm in some important way—the physically or mentally disabled, those who are overweight or obese, those who suffer from infectious diseases ranging from leprosy to HIV/ AIDS, as well as members of certain cultural and minority groups. While the exact mechanisms are unknown, the stigmatization process most certainly includes a complex array of personal, interpersonal, and structural components. Link and Phelan (2001) refer to this as a labyrinth of details that creates substantial social inequalities in life circumstances even when it is difficult for an individual to specify any single causal event. Multiple, mutually reinforcing mechanisms are used by dominant groups to maintain their pre-eminence. When one mechanism is weakened, another is strengthened. Over time the process becomes increasingly complex, subtle, and covert.

When mechanisms are not fully understood—either because they are complex, mutually reinforcing, or difficult to discern—effective intervention becomes more difficult; though not impossible. The famous public health example of John Snow-who took the handle off the Broad Street water pump in London, to stave off the cholera epidemic of 1854—shows how the causal chain of events can be disrupted even without knowing the specific causal agent. Snow's intervention predated germ theory by about 10 years (Friis & Sellers, 1996). Yet, as already pointed out, what makes stigma different is that there is no single causal pathway, but many different mutually reinforcing parts all of which interact like cogs to create cycles of disadvantage. There is no single agent to disrupt; no simple fix; no handle to remove from the pump.

Although the pervasiveness and complexity of stigma may be daunting, Sartorius has argued that the cyclical complexity gives us multiple entry points and wide room for action (Sartorius & Schulze, 2005). Thus, in his view, there is no one who could not contribute to fighting stigma and its consequences, and

no perspective that could not (or, perhaps should not) be accommodated. Indeed, scientific interest in stigma has come from a variety of disciplines-everything from law to humanities and from policy to practice. This has resulted in a rich but scattered literature with little opportunity for inter-disciplinary syntheses. Methodological innovations and findings have not easily found their way across the various substantive areas of investigation and there has been little theoretical or methodological discussion about benchmarks for success for anti-stigma work. Much of the theoretical research has been grounded in scientific world views that have excluded the lived experiences of people who bear the brunt of stigma and discrimination. New person-centred approaches to measurement are emerging, but they remain in their infancy pending future psychometric validation. At the same time, policy and public health interest in reducing stigma is on the rise and new programs are emerging at international, national, and regional levels. Yet, scientific attempts to bridge the knowledge-to-action gap have been meagre. As a result, many programs have not been evaluated or remain uninformed about best principles or practices.

The time is ripe for an inter-disciplinary platform to foster scholarly discussion and debate; and to consolidate and expand best practice knowledge in stigma reduction. It is with these goals in mind that scholars from a variety of disciplines have come together to create Stigma Research and Action. Our Editorial Board and organizational partners are committed to providing an international forum for research and practice pertaining to social prejudice and discrimination, whatever their manifestations: health conditions, disabilities, or socio-cultural standing.

This, our inaugural issue of Stigma Research and Action, illustrates our commitment to maintaining the broadest possible perspective. We have included original research pertaining to HIV and homosexuality stigma (Cianelli et al.; Liu et al.), obesity bias (Li & Rukavina), mental illness stigma (Chanean et al.;

General Editing Instructions (RDA)

- Transcribe (RDA/LCPS 1.7) vs. Record
 - Capitalization
 - Abbreviations

- Authorized access points (Appendix E/LCPS 1.7.1)
 - Preferred titles (RDA 6.2.1)
 - Names (RDA 8.5)




Title Proper -- RDA/LCPS 2.3.2

MARC 245 \$a\$n\$p

- Transcribe from basis of description/preferred source
- Capitalize as appears or follow Appendix A
- Include articles and set filing indicator
- Do not transcribe introductory words
- Supply mark of omission for numbers/dates (including at beginning of title)
- Correct misspellings and add misspelling as title access point
- Transcribe names as title proper with no supplied subtitle
- If no title anywhere, supply title

Other Title Information – RDA 2.3.4

MARC 245 \$b

- AACR2 CSR
 - Required in limited situations
 - Can use quoted note (cataloger's judgment)
- RDA CSR: Not CONSER Core
 - May transcribe if it provides clarification or support to a title proper that otherwise is misleading
- If transcribed, must come from same source as title proper



Statement of Responsibility (Title Proper) – RDA 2.4.2

MARC 245 \$c

- Not CONSER Core
 - May be transcribed in 550 if important for identification
 - Instead rely on authorized access points (AACR2/RDA)
 - Use relationship designators (RDA)



- RDA 2.3.6 Variant title on resource
- RDA/LCPS 2.3.2.13 Later title propers that represent minor changes

Publication (AACR2)

MARC 260 \$a\$b\$c

- Not required to transcribe dates (\$c)
- Only first-named place required (\$a)
- If no formal publishing statement, infer from:
 - Address of issuing body
 - Editorial office address (not personal address of editor)
 - Subscription address
- For eSerials: Transcribe if readily available, otherwise provide probable place or [s.l.]
- Abbreviate per Appendix B
- Allowed to omit hierarchy in publisher name




Publication (RDA) -- RDA/LCPS 2.8

MARC 264 #1 \$a\$b\$c

- Only first-named place (\$a) or publisher (\$b) required
- Prefer supplying probable place/publisher rather than place/name of distributor/manufacturer
- Do not omit levels of corporate hierarchy
- Record dates (\$c) if known and first/last issue are in hand
- Copyright date not required (LCPS 2.11)

- If complete, but not known give term (e.g., volumes)
- Use terms listed at 3.3.1.3

Numbering/Dates (AACR2 CSR)

- Use MARC 362 1# Began... to supply numbering/dates of publication whenever this information is available, regardless of whether the first/last issue(s) are in hand or not
- Captions and months may be transcribed as found (including abbreviations and capitalization) or they may be recorded using standard AACR2 abbreviations.
- Numbers (including ordinal numbers) may be transcribed as found or they may be recorded as Arabic numerals, whichever is easier
- If numbering is not present or known, give the beginning date of publication or the copyright date
- If numbering includes both issue number and date, put parentheses around the date
- Include new series designations, changes in numbering, etc., in this field or in the 515, whichever is clearer
- Substitute a hyphen for a slash for clarity (2008-2009 may be transcribed as 2008/2009)



Numbering/Dates (RDA CSR) – RDA/LCPS 2.6

Four separate RDA elements

- Numeric and/or alphabetic designation of first issue or part of sequence (2.6.2)
- Chronological designation of first issue or part of sequence (2.6.3)
- Numeric and/or alphabetic designation of last issue or part of sequence (2.6.4)
- Chronological designation of last issue or part of sequence (2.6.5)
- But in practice, RDA CSR is similar to AACR2 CSR



Numbering/Dates (RDA CSR) – RDA/LCPS 2.6

- Use MARC 362 1# Began... to supply numbering/dates of publication whenever this information is available, regardless of whether the first/last issue(s) are in hand or not
- Captions and months are transcribed as found
- Numbers are transcribed as found. However, LCPS 1.8.2 2nd alternative: catalogers are allowed to provide an alternative form (tome III [3])
- If numbering is not present or known, give the beginning date of publication or the copyright date
- If numbering includes both issue number and date, put parentheses around the date
- Include new series designations, changes in numbering, etc., in this field or in the 515, whichever is clearer
- Substitute a hyphen for a slash for clarity (2008-2009 may be transcribed as 2008/2009)



Series Statement (AACR2 CSR)

Either MARC 490 or 8XX

- MARC 490 required <u>only</u> if series added entry not being made
- Useful if changes in a series title over time need to be documented

Series Statement (RDA CSR) – RDA 2.12

RDA core if authorized access point for series not provided

Only 3 elements required

- <u>Title proper</u> of series/subseries (MARC 490 \$a -- RDA 2.12.2/2.12.10)
- <u>ISSN</u> of series/subseries (MARC 490 \$x RDA 2.12.8/2.12.16)
- Numbering within series/subseries (MARC 490 \$v RDA 2.12.9/2.12.17)

Note: Do not abbreviate series numbering captions and do not change Roman numerals to Arabic numerals

Current CSR Guidelines

- Should be generally-accessibly URLs that point to publisher's version or trusted archive
- Institution-specific URLs or URLs requiring a password should not be recorded in the CONSER record

RDA Guidelines

LCPS 4.6.1.4 outlines a practice similar to the current LCRI
 9.7



Language/Script of Expression/Content – RDA 6.11/7.12

MARC Lang/041/546

CSR (AACR & RDA)

- Record complete information regarding languages in MARC 546
- Only required to provide \$a in 041
- Only required to provide script in 546 \$b if
 - the language is commonly written in more than one script, or
 - the content is in a script that is not the primary one for the language



Title Source Note – RDA/LCPS 2.20.2

MARC 588

- No change in practice other than recording of date/numbering already mentioned
 - Always note both DBO and LIC in separate 588s
 - Always cite title source (even if t.p.)
 - Always cite provider and date viewed
- RDA wording (*Identification of the resource based on...*) is only an example. CONSER will continue to use *Description based on...*



AACR2 CSR: All headings are required per AACR2

RDA CSR: Only primary creator and any access point used to construct an authorized access point are required. Others access points are left to cataloger judgment.

Generally don't provide added entries for sponsoring bodies

RDA CSR

In this case, no primary creator

Sponsoring body is a relationship designation so cataloger's judgment on whether sponsor is an access point

Relationships Between Works, Expressions & Manifestations

- No significant differences between AACR2 & RDA CSR practices
- Recommended practice to provide relationship designator if MARC tagging doesn't describe the relationship (MARC 787)

Related Serial Works (RDA Chapter 25)

- Sequential (MARC 780/785)
- Accompanying/Supplemental (MARC 770/772, 787)
- Whole/Part in a Monographic Series (MARC 830)

Related Serial Expressions (RDA Chapter 26)

- Translations (MARC 765/767)

RDA 6.2.2.3

If a work is published simultaneously in the same language under different titles, choose the title proper of the first resource received as the preferred title



Related Serial Manifestations (RDA Chapter 27)

- Different formats (MARC 776)
- Reproductions (MARC 775)
- Reprints (MARC 775)

LC RDA policy for reproductions is to <u>follow RDA and catalog</u> <u>the reproduction</u> (although serial reproductions are still cataloged as serial even if mode of issuance is single-unit or multipart monograph)
