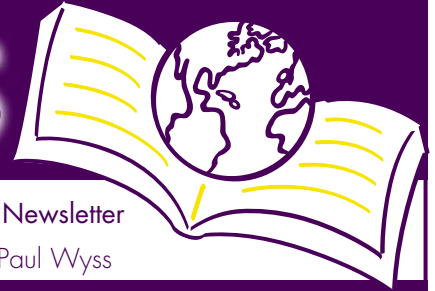

## 2017 COMMON READ HIGHLIGHTS

This year's Common Read book was *Out of Chaos: Reflections of a University President and his Contemporaries on Vietnam-Era Unrest in Mankato and its Relevance Today* by former Mankato State College president, James F. Nickerson. The book is a collection of reminiscences about historic events that took place in Mankato during the turbulent 1960s and 1970s.

The Common Read program showcases numerous ways Minnesota State Mankato collaborates on and off campus. Library Services and the Common Read Committee would like to thank everyone who included *Out of Chaos* in their classes and programs. Additionally, Library Services thanks the Honors Department for offering several "Campus as Text" Walkabout activities. The Walkabouts were presented by student volunteers and made available to classes and interested individuals. Gratitude goes to the Kessel Peace Institute for their Social Justice Lecture Series event, *Changing the World without Having a Clue*, presented by Greg Bennick on October 11, 2017. Special thanks go to the Blue Earth County Historical Society for offering *Out of Chaos: Music of the Times* on October 19 as part of the History Bits & Bites series.

On November 1, 2017, Minnesota State University, Mankato hosted the Common Read Keynote Event in the Centennial Student Union (CSU) Ballroom. The Minnesota State Mankato-made documentary film *Two Weeks in May* was shown to an audience of approximately 460 people. A discussion with five alumni members featured in the movie followed the showing.

Additional showings of the documentary film were held on November 2 at the First Presbyterian Church, November 14 at the Kessel Peace Awards, and on December 21 at the Blue Earth County Historical Society's History Bits & Bites program. To date, over 600 people have viewed *Two Weeks in May*. Other Common Read programs offered by Library Services in the fall included a film showing of *The Day the 60s Died: The Kent State Shootings* and a presentation by alumnus Tim Madigan, *The Myths and Realities of the 1960s: Use of Critical Thinking*. Over 140 students participated in a T-shirt tying activity. To support the exploration and understanding of the book, the Common Read Committee created 20 Learning Activities which were available on the Common Read website, [www.mnsu.edu/commonread](http://www.mnsu.edu/commonread). Topics covered included: the Vietnam War, the Draft, Kent State, James F. Nickerson, Abbas Kessel, Law Enforcement, Main Street Bridge and North Star Bridge Protests, and more.

## Streaming Video Subscriptions Available through the Library

The following streaming video subscriptions are available to students, faculty and staff through the library website. Your StarID login is required for off-campus use.

- **Alexander Street Video:** Hundreds of films on Ethnography, Counseling, Theatre and Dance.
- **Ambrose Digital:** 100+ multi-volume series of 30-minute films on a variety of subjects, created specifically for college classrooms.
- **Docuseek2:** 800 titles from major documentary vendors; strong in environment, sciences, health, and social issues.
- **Kanopy:** More than 30,000 titles from a wide range of distributors, such as Criterion and Media Education Foundation. This includes documentaries, educational, and training films as well as classic, independent, and foreign language films.

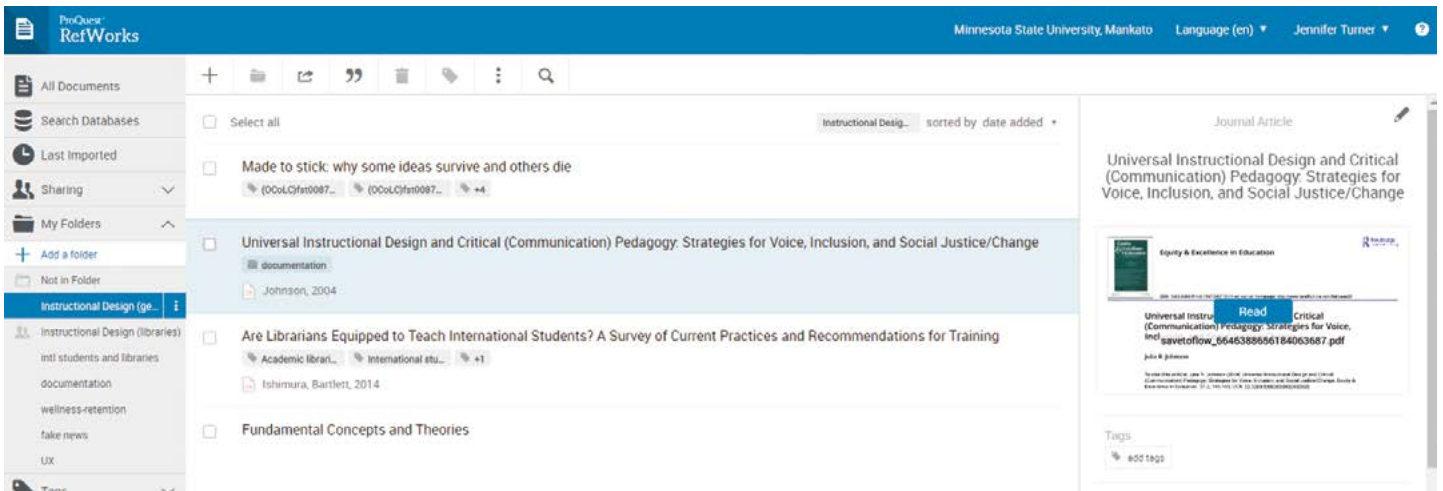


## New RefWorks is Here!

## Forestry Field Kit

Students can determine the species, height, or diameter of a tree with the materials included in this kit. They can also study the annual growth rings using a borer or the water quality using a TDS meter.

Kit includes:

- Recreational field compass
- 3-thread increment tree borer
- Garmin eTrex 20x GPS
- LED 45x handheld magnifier
- Penetrometer
- 100-foot fiberglass measuring tape
- TDS meter, water quality electrical tester
- Trees of Minnesota field guide
- Birds of Minnesota field guide
- 12-inch plastic ruler

## LOOKING FOR MSU AUTHORS

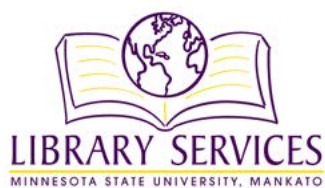
