### Behind the Scenes of Course Reserves

Minnesota State University, Mankato Circulation Technician Steve Johnson shares insights into his work behind the scenes in Memorial Library

Memorial Library has grown and changed significantly in the last 20-plus years, and Circulation Technician Steve Johnson has grown alongside it.

After graduating from MNSU Mankato in 1997, Johnson eventually returned to Memorial Library, where he now supervises student workers, oversees collections maintenance, and works on the Library's Course Reserves program. Reserves include books, e-books, and media from Library collections, faculty-owned resources, and MavTextbooks to support current courses.

"It used to be just Library-owned and faculty-owned course materials" Johnson said about titles on reserve in the textbook collection. The Maverick Textbook Reserve Program is a lending initiative championed by Student Government and fulfilled by the Library. Today, Student Government, Library Services, and Barnes and Noble cooperatively administer the program. Course Reserves and MavTextbooks are part of the University's ongoing initiatives to promote textbook affordability.

"Back in the day, it was a lot slower in the Library," said Johnson of when he was a student at Mankato. Memorial Library at the time was primarily focused around study spaces, with few computers available in the building. "But once the computer ball got rolling, usage picked up a ton."

MavText transformed along with the Library in this period—more courses than ever are part of the program, and many materials are available as e-books.

Though much of Johnson's work occurs behind-the-scenes, it is of critical importance to students, staff, and faculty. Weeks before a given semester begins, Johnson receives a list of books requested for MavText from Barnes and Noble; he retrieves the materials

questions, check with a Reference Librarian or staffperson. "Because there's a ton of stuff we have here that students and faculty don't know about and could be extremely helpful."

The people in Memorial Library also happen to be Johnson's favorite aspect of his job. "The people I work with are fantastic," he added. "The aim is to help students and patrons and we do a darn good job of it."

Johnson supervises student workers, oversees collections maintenance, and works on the Maverick Textbook Reserve Program.

from library shelves, and works with library colleagues to order items not already in the collection. These books then receive special processing and labeling before they are made available for checkout. Johnson maintains an online database where patrons can see which subjects, courses, or instructors have materials available through course reserves.

This work must be completed in a short timeframe in order for textbooks to be available to students. Requests for new textbooks should be directed by faculty to the Campus Bookstore manager "as early as possible," Johnson said.

"It's been a good collaboration [with the Bookstore]", Johnson continued. "They've been very helpful in choosing books and keeping track of items."

Beyond course reserves, Johnson emphasized that the most overlooked resource in the Library is its people. Said Johnson, "If you have





### **American Library Association Bookclub Features Monika Antonelli**


Minnesota State Mankato professor and Outreach Librarian Monika Antonelli recently co-hosted an American Library Association (ALA) book club event on the final chapter of the book Libraries & Sustainability: Programs and Practices for Community *Impact.* ALA is a 55,000+ member professional library association. Antonelli, along with the other book editors, René Tanner, Adrian K. Ho, and Rebekkah Smith Aldrich, co-wrote the chapter "Libraries in the Donut

Economy," which focused on tenets of sustainability for libraries, and how equity, community, and disaster preparedness are crucial to creating a new economic vision for the planet. All participants who registered for the event received a free copy of the book.

Antonelli and her co-hosts presented on their research particularly on sustainable economic theory by economist Kate Raworth—and fielded questions on how libraries

can become leaders in sustainability in their community. Finally, the hosts moderated a group activity where over 170 librarians and library staff collaborated to envision sustainable Earth Day library programming. Two additional ALA programs featuring book chapter discussions from her book Libraries & Sustainability will be held in December 2022.

### Minnesota Heritage **Response Training**

It's good to be prepared! This September, University Archivist and Special Collections Librarian Daardi Mixon and Archives Technician Adam Smith participated in the 2022 MN Heritage Response Training. There, they heard from experts on salvage techniques and participated in tabletop exercises simulating disaster scenarios. The Minnesota Alliance for Heritage Response is a "statewide network of museums, archives, libraries, performing arts organizations, historic preservation groups, and emergency responders dedicated to preparing for and responding to disasters affecting collections and historic properties" with a goal of "sharing resources and creating an environment of cooperation and preparedness in order to reduce the impact of emergency situations on Minnesota collections and historic properties."

### **Obituary** and Scrapbook Index

University Archives and the Southern Minnesota Historical Center have been working hard with IT Solutions on an exciting new initiative.

Thanks to IT Solutions' technical work behind the scenes and Archives student workers' labor entering obituary information, the Mankato Free Press Obituary Index and Minnesota Historical Society Scrapbook Index have been migrated from their old pages to a brand new database available for patrons to use.



The updated interface will allow for easier access to research such as genealogy and family history and transform this important community resource into a more engaging and educational tool.
