El Puente Christian School








While studying abroad in Costa Rica during the summer of 2018, I volunteered at El Puente Christian School, an English and Spanish school educating students from the age of 4 to 14 years old. During my time there I helped preschool age students with their English writing, while communicating and explaining the work to them in Spanish so that they could understand more effectively (code switching). I also helped fourth grade students with math, which is their main focus and struggle at that age in this particular school. One of the most interesting things about this experience was the setting. The students were most literally learning in a jungle, with howler monkeys being a big distraction (and irritant) some days. We would take the students on walks around the more forested area outside of the school grounds some days when they needed breaks. We recorded different animals and plants that we saw on these walks and then reflect about them back at the classroom. I would have loved to learn about nature and our place/purpose on the earth in this way as a child. It was also interesting working with the preschool students being that their Spanish wasn't always clear, let alone their little understanding of English. I had been in similar situations before while working with bilingual children, but this was much harder because the students were not even surrounded by English in their day-to-day lives, as children in the U.S. would be. Overall, this was my favorite and most valuable volunteering experience. It taught me more about the culture of the Costa Rican people. It also taught me about myself in major language-barrier situations, and how to improvise and communicate in other ways (pictures, sounds, actions).

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
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Traveling: India, Europe, Belize, Costa Rica, The U.S.

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How has the Honors Program led me to becoming a Global Citizen?

As a child I traveled often with my family. I always believed that this made me "cultured", but travel alone does not make a person a Global Citizen. The concept of "Global Citizenship" was new to me as I entered the Honors Program. What did a Global Citizen have that I hadn't already obtained from my various travels? Well, a lot. Through my varied experiences in college, specifically the Honors Program, I feel that I have become a well-rounded Global Citizen, rather than solely a "cultured" traveler.

A major aspect of embodying Global Citizenship is having the ability to recognize your own culture and ask critical questions. The path to Self-Awareness began for me while learning about other cultures, as well as when I was living in a completely different culture. I became most aware of my own culture, one of a Global North, White, American citizen, through studying abroad in Quepos, Costa Rica. After this experience, I began asking deeper cultural questions about Costa Rica, other post-colonial nations, and myself. I continued to study and discover new layers and history about Costa Rican and post-colonial culture through Dr. Haque and Dr. Harrison's class on the "greening" of Costa Rica. Now, I find myself diving into a self discovery again, though from a new direction, in my study of the tradition aspects of yoga.

To complete the Knowledge and Understanding competency, one needs to begin asking questions that go deeper than the surface of culture and tradition and begin making lasting connections with people outside of their own culture. I feel as if I really dove into this competency through my study abroad experience and my studies on post-colonial Costa Rica afterwards.

My experience with the Communication competency was unique for me in that I studied both Spanish and Portuguese while in college. Portuguese is a language that I have surface level proficiency in, differing from my Spanish language ability, in which I am able to analyze and think critically about various subjects. Having the ability to realize my varied proficiency levels helps me in being empathetic to foreign language English learners.

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How did the Honors Program encourage me to participate in Research?
