

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Minnesota State University, Mankato


August 2017 - December 2021

Throughout my time at Minnesota State University, Mankato, I have had so many experiences and opportunities that were only available to me through my participation in the Honors Program.

My very first day on campus freshman year was for learning community priority move-in. As a first-year Honors learning community student, I was able to move in a day early - and beat the crowds! That first evening on campus, I got to meet my peers in the Honors learning community: the people I would end up spending much of that year with. With the beginning of the semester came our Honors FYEX class. The first day of class brought many emotions: excitement, nervousness, and a bit of trepidation. The future looked exciting, but the whole idea of the Honors program was a lot to take in right away. However, it would get better. Throughout the fall, we learned about the competencies of the Honors Program - leadership, research, and global citizenship - building a nice strong base on which we could construct the rest of our collegiate careers. The deep discussions and thought-provoking assignments stood out during my freshman year. While many of my other classes were very reminiscent of my High School classes, Honors FYEX stood out from the crowd: it was special!

My second year at MNSU, I was a part of the Emerging Leaders Honors learning community. Through this learning community, I took two Honors seminars with a cohort of students that included many I had spent time with my freshman year. These seminars pushed me further as a leader and forced me to be an active participant in class; whereas I usually enjoy silently observing. This second year, I was pushed to participate in the Integrated Business Experience. Without having a friendly face in my fellow Honors student Mason Vlaanderen, I would not have had as much courage to step forward and shine as a leader in my IBE Company. It was also during this time that I simultaneously realized I needed some time to figure out if I actually wanted to finish my degree in Accounting, and had the opportunity to study Theology at a small private institute for one year. Without the encouragement from my Honors advisor, Ginny Walters, I don't know if I would have been able to take the literal leap of faith, jumping into a different academic experience and still being able to seamlessly come back a year later.

There are so many different ways that the Honors Program has shaped the man I've become in the last 4 ½ years that I can't even try to count them. The Honors Program has brought so many valuable and beautiful relationships to my time at MNSU. It has been a constant through my crazy, winding journey to graduation. I've learned the best way I can be a leader, and how to stand back when someone else is more adequate for the job. I've learned how to synthesize data and parse financial statements. Leadership Synthesis

Throughout my time at MNSU, I have grown as a leader both in and out of the classroom. My growth as a leader is separated into two main phases: development and application. Much of my development phase happened in the classroom, where I learned about different leadership styles, philosophies, and ways to apply great leadership. Conversely, most of my application phase happened outside of the classroom, through jobs and academic extracurriculars.

The development phase started the day I moved into my dorm freshman year. As part of the Honors First-Year Learning Community, I learned how to informally work in a group setting as both a leader and a group member. It also allowed me to see how the values I'd gained from my past experiences and upbringing could either help or hinder my ability to be an effective leader. As a part of my Honors FYEX class, I learned about the leadership competency of the Honors program and introspectively begin to develop my personal leadership philosophy. My development continued into my second year at MNSU in my class, Developing Your Mentor Philosophy. In this class, I teetered on the edge of applying my leadership philosophy. I was able to both develop my individual mentor philosophy and put it into action by applying it to working in Residential Life and my Honors mentee relationship. This class helped show me ways I struggled as a leader and would need to improve, but also ways I could greatly excel.

I also began to move into the application phase during my second year at MNSU. As a <u>Community Advisor</u>, I learned about how I was much better at working with information than with people and found that the dynamic of the team I was on could greatly affect my attitude and effort towards projects and goals. Later that year, I participated in the <u>Integrated Business Experience</u>, where I applied leadership to a mock corporate structure as a Chief Financial Officer. This experience taught me about how proper delegation and giving meaningful work could create the most efficient team. It also gave me a chance to implement my leadership philosophy, seeing what worked well and what needed improvement. My next two years involved several capstone leadership experiences. First, I practiced executive, broad leadership as the <u>Class President at Ambassador Bible College</u>. I learned that taking the leap of faith into scary experiences and positions that I felt unqualified for brought the largest learning curve. I improved on seeing the whole picture while trusting my team to pull through; I also learned to celebrate the small victories when nothing seemed to go right. Second, I learned about individual, specific leadership as an <u>Audit Intern at CliftonLarsonAllen</u>. I experienced how leadership philosophies can apply to teams of one, and how to work as a team on high-stakes projects.

Throughout my collegiate career, my leadership philosophy has also grown and flourished as with me. As a servant leader, it is my goal to give my team the tools they need and best experience they can have to succeed, individually and as a team. One of my mentors once said, "Servant leadership is training your team so they can one day replace you." I strive to lead in such a way that my mentees are competent enough to replace me, but to simultaneously be invaluable through my diligence, attitude, and hard work. As I continue onto graduate school and begin my career with CliftonLarsonAllen, I will continue to push myself to grow as a leader and be a life-long learner. Through the journey to perfect leadership, you may find there is no such thing, but if you have empathy, a love of learning, and a willingness to correct your mistakes, there are no limits to what you can achieve.

Global Citizenship Synthesis


When I started college at MNSU, I was not very cognizant of my unique culture, or very welcoming to other cultures as a Global Citizen. However, throughout my time at Minnesota State, I have learned, through many different experiences, how important it is to be a well-versed Global Citizen: open to unique experiences, beliefs, and always willing to challenge a preconceived notion that may not be true. As I developed, I learned about my own culture, the culture of others, and how those two things don't have to be at odds. I then moved on to applying my knowledge as a Global Citizen in my studies and travels.

I started learning about other cultures and how to have open, civil conversations with people who are different from me in my Honors FYEX class. This class helped me to be more aware of other people's cultures and developed a strong base for more growing experiences. This helped me be more open and honest in the Cultural Autobiography I wrote for my Human Relations in a Multicultural Society class. This paper introduced me to reflective writing and allowed me to meditate on the privileges and drawbacks that came out of my unique experience growing up. I was also able to think about how I'd been treated for having beliefs that are different from the majority growing up, and the consideration I should give to others who fall into that category too in the future. This reflective experience helped prepare me for my Service-Learning Project. I was able to learn about a community I didn't have much experience with, those who have memory-loss diseases – like Alzheimer's or Dementia – and learned about the similarities and differences we had. I also got to combat some preconceived notions I'd had about this community, and learned about different types of verbal and nonverbal communication depending on someone's exceptionalities.

After developing some skills of being a Global Citizen, I was able to start applying it through several experiences. In my Spanish class, I was able to learn about different cultures, and see how difficult it was to integrate into a new language and its culture, especially if you were not in the forgiving and friendly environment of a classroom. I also learned how much of a connecting force language can be. I then got to learn about a new culture during my Trip to London. I was able to see some of the cultural differences between London and my experience in small-town USA, as well as learn about the culture of people from several different European countries. All of these experiences helped prime me for my Comparative Religions Class, where I got to learn about religious from all corners of the world. In this class, I was awed by just how similar every religion seemed to be, with many having similarities with aspects of Christianity that I had always thought were unique to that faith. I learned about faiths that I already had baseless thoughts about, and was able to examine the devotion and faith that seemed to be universal across religions.

From day 1 to graduation, I have seen tremendous growth in my ability to meet and relate with different cultures, as well as realizing that my ethnocentric view of the world may not always be correct or accurate. Being a Global Citizen doesn't mean you have to agree with somebody who has different views; it is being able to have open and honest conversations with people to get to know their beliefs, values, and culture, as well as who they are. It is also being able to admit you were originally wrong when you learn more information about a culture. As I graduate and move into the rest of my life, I will always be growing and learning, tweaking my worldview as I continue to grow as a Global Citizen!

Research Synthesis

When I first began the Honors program, I did not think there would be many rich, exciting opportunities to learn how to research and apply it to my future career. However, I have been able to participate in many unique and valuable types of research during my time at Minnesota State University, Mankato. I began the process of becoming a research all-star by learning how to develop my information literacy and synthesis skills. I then began to do my own original research and studied how to efficiently disseminate what I'd learned.

My first contact with research at MNSU was during freshman year in my Honors FYEX class. In this class, I learned that I was not quite as informationally literate as I had assumed I was coming out of high school. I was also able to learn how to efficiently synthesize the information I'd researched into a cohesive hypothesis or thesis statement. During that same semester, I was also able to integrate my newfound research skills into the Philosophy Paper I wrote for my Intro to Ethics class. I improved my skill of downsizing pertinent information I'd find during my research into smaller, manageable chunks for the people consuming my writing, and helped me be more open to research topics that were outside of my comfort zone. That spring, I got to continue applying my literacy and synthesis skills in my final Geography Paper for my Intro to Geography class. This essay gave me practice on the art of writing a cohesive research narrative and helped me gain discernment of high quality vs. poor quality research.

My second year in school, I was able to pivot to doing original research and disseminating said research. My first opportunity for original research was in my Exploring Personal Leadership class. I was able to research homelessness and near-homelessness in addition to developing a project that would help spread awareness of those communities in the Mankato area. I got to see research as a beginning-to-end process during this experience. I also got to practice research from beginning to end in the Integrated Business Experience that same semester. In this experience, I got to research and build an entire financial information system for my company, as well as analyzing financial scenarios for my company's loan. I gained a lot of knowledge on how to most efficiently complete the research process. I also got experience in disseminating the results of my company's research and performance to interested parties. My newfound knowledge in original research and dissemination from these two experiences helped me greatly when I was preparing an Accounting Presentation for my Intermediate Financial Accounting II class. This helped show me what information needed to be shared, and helped hone my presentation skills to be a clear and concise speaker.

Throughout all my research experiences at Minnesota State, I have seen tremendous growth in my ability to comprehend and analyze complex - and sometimes contradictory - information. I have learned that the purpose of research is to gain an understanding of a topic that can then be shared with other interested people, and am excited to grow these skills during Graduate School and, afterwards, implement them into my career as a CPA!
