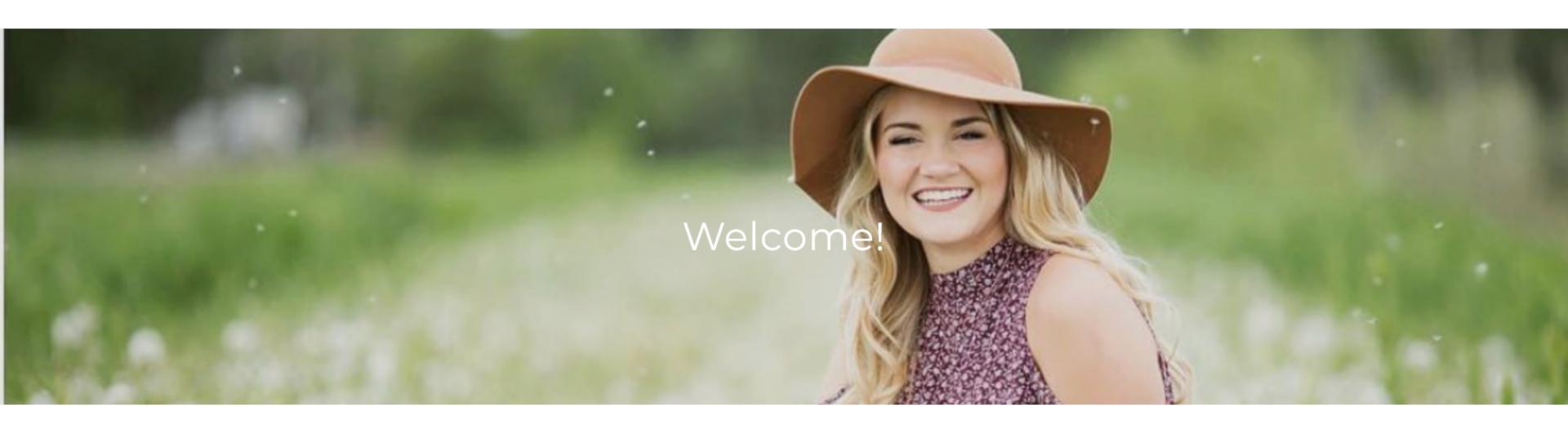

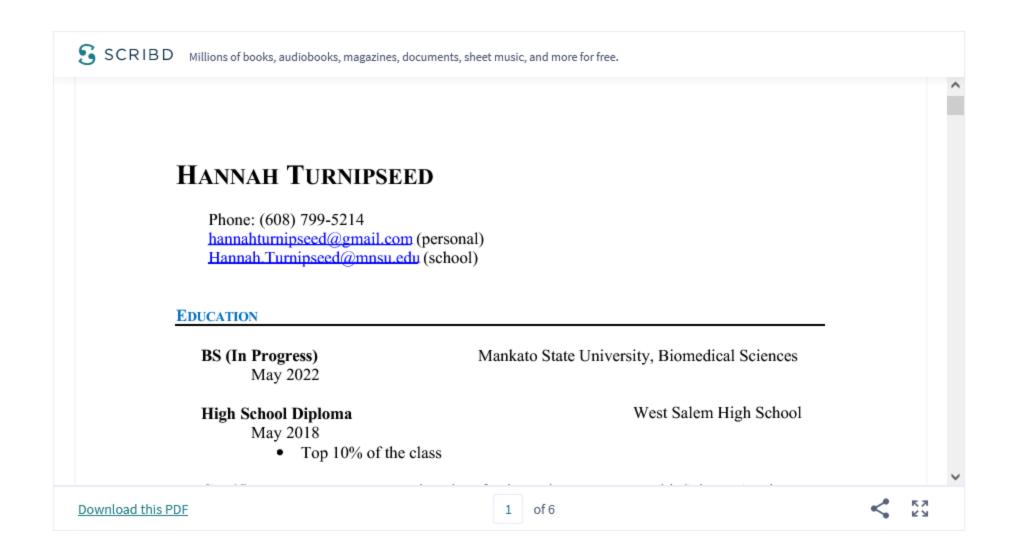
About Me

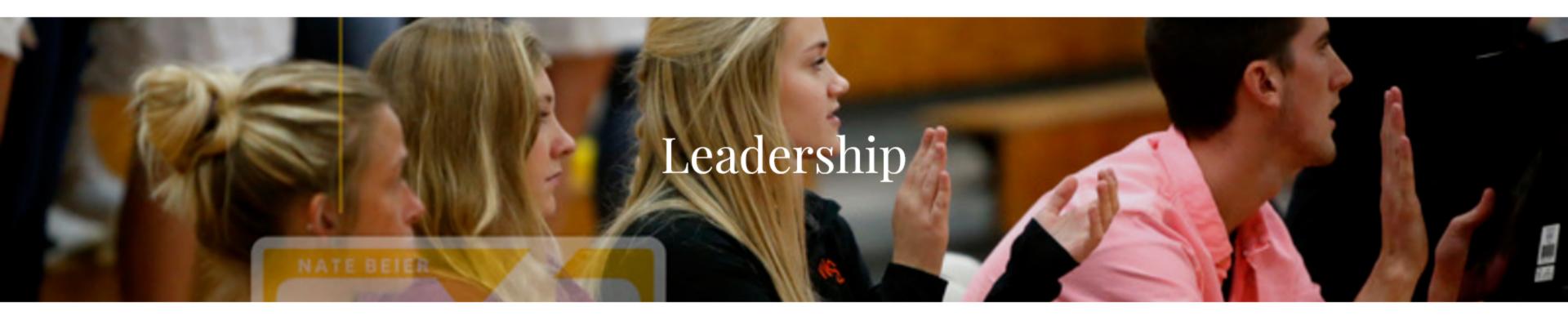

For myself, the leadership philosophy that works for me is staying true to myself in leadership positions by guiding a group with confidence to help them reach individual or common goals, before reaching my own. I have always put others before myself, in a healthy way, so one helping others achieve their goals is a goal of mine. Research Synthesis

Before attending Mankato State University, I knew I would be exposed to research opportunities as a Biomedical science major, however I was unsure what these opportunities would look like. Over the past four years, I have taken myself outside my comfort zone to learn and conduct research in several ways. My experiences in a library activity, completing an Endocrinology research project, and Professor Andersons research lab have helped me recognize the importance of understanding effective and ethical research writings, and how to use that knowledge towards studying research ideas of my own.

I started developing my hands-on research skills in biology courses, but I did not understand the importance of written research until I completed a <u>library activity</u> through the Honors 201 course. The library activity focused on reviewing several research sources and deciding whether they were credible or not. Although I have written lab reports in the past, the biology courses did not explain how to evaluate a credible and ethical source. I have since been able to apply these skills writing article summaries for my research lab with Professor Anderson and complete research projects for classes such as Endocrinology.

The research project I completed for <u>Endocrinology</u> was based on the disorder Gigantism. We were instructed to use primary articles or reviews to obtain information such as history, causes, and treatments for the disorder. My knowledge from the library activity allowed me to choose articles from the PubMed database that contained accurate and ethical information. The Gigantism research project also expanded my synthesizing skills by taking complex information and rewording it in a way that was more suitable to my scientific language. While reading the complex articles, it opened my eyes to the significance of incorporating as much detail as possible to scientific papers. Adding detail helps individuals fully understand and potentially expand on the research to develop new findings.

During the last three semesters I have been on Professor Anderson's research team. Our research focuses on the bacteria, Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA). The research I am currently working on involves MRSA vs.

Disinfectants. As previously stated, I have been able to develop my information literacy and synthesis skills by writing article summaries based on the research I have conducted. My research experience with Professor Anderson has also helped me develop my own research question and perform experiments to test my hypothesis. I plan to present the data I obtain at the Undergraduate Research Symposium this spring. Through my research, I have been able to recognize the importance of mistakes in science. Due to human error, I have redone my procedure three times to create an experiment that gives the most accurate results.

Overall, I have gained a deeper understanding of research and all it may entail. My research experiences have allowed me to expand my problem-solving and critical thinking skills. Research I have completed has also shown me how to apply these critical thinking and problem-solving skills to other scenarios in life. In the future, I hope to continuously enhance my knowledge and expertise in the research competency by developing my own thesis or joining a research team in dental school. During my gap year, I would like to work in a research lab as well to gain more hands-on experience and enhance my critical thinking skills.

Global Citizenship

Global Citizenship Synthesis

Before coming to college, I have lived in communities that were not considered diverse. Growing up in these communities hindered my idea of what global citizenship was because I was not exposed to it. After joining the Honors Program, I have been able to put myself in uncomfortable situations to learn about my culture and the cultures of those surrounding me. Thankfully, I have been able to develop a clearer idea of global citizenship through experiences in Spanish language learning, listening to the Hidden Brain podcast, learning about the Lakota Tribe, and taking an Explorations of Yoga honors class.

Throughout college and experiences outside of the classroom, I have learned how to apply my global citizenship understanding to dive deeper into the Spanish culture. Although I have been learning the Spanish language for several years, I did not immerse myself in the culture. Realizing the purpose of the global citizenship competency helped me understand that learning a different language does not mean you know the culture. A Hidden Brain podcast called "Lost in Translation" taught me that language and culture are linked. I had studied the Spanish language for several years, but I did not go the extra mile to respectfully learn the culture. I was given the opportunity to immerse myself in a Spanish speaking culture on a trip to Mexico. My trip to Mexico helped me overcome certain biases I have developed about the culture based on assumptions pulled from information I have heard. This experience opened my eyes to the type of culture I have been living in, which has diverted me to be more mindful of the information with which I surround myself with.

While starting to enhance my knowledge of different cultures, I thought back to a youth leadership trip I took to Pine Ridge, South Dakota. On this trip I met several members of the Lakota Nation, but my group focused on teaching leadership skills. I took it upon myself to reach out to the individuals I met to learn more about their culture because I was beginning to understand the benefits of learning the cultures of others around you. What I learned made me realize how different and similar cultures can be. Everyone takes pride in their culture but conversing with the Lakota Nation made me noticed that I do not take as much pride in my culture(s) as I should. On top of being educated about the Lakota Tribe, I was able to question the kind of culture I find myself living in. Along with the Lakota Nation, I put myself in a culturally uncomfortable situation by volunteering at Connections Ministry. While volunteering here, I learned how to shift my mindset on bias I have developed and educate those around me. Slowly, I have concluded that we can be comprised of many cultures based on different factors that make us who we are.

Exploring my own culture has been difficult for me but taking an <u>Explorations of Yoga course</u> helped me face these difficulties. The yoga course did not only show me the physical and mental benefits of practicing yoga, but the culture and values behind it. In yogi culture, there are concepts known as the East and West concepts which focus on self-recognition and our grounding to the earth, which is something I find our society struggles with. Learning about the concepts helped me realize the importance of how we speak to ourselves in verbal and nonverbal ways. Learning how to communicate in verbal and nonverbal ways has helped me continue my journey to self-awareness of my own culture.

Global citizenship has taught me how to reflect on different cultures and cultures of my own. I have also learned how to respectfully approach understanding and learning about different cultures. By developing awareness to global citizenship, I will be able to use the knowledge and skills I have learned when applying to dental schools. The comprehension of different cultures will be critical to providing exceptional patient care when I become a dentist.
